

Possession of a handgun by a juvenile.





MOBILE, AL MODEL

• 5 Primary Goals:

- Promote public safety by reducing delinquent activities
- Provide the opportunity to live a violent-free lifestyle
- Reduce the need for "out of home" placement
- Improve school performance and attendance
- Identify family deficits and provide appropriate resources and services
- Post adjudication intensive program which consists of weekly court supervision, a five week gun education program, and may also include other treatment and community services.
- Three Phases, and designed to be 6 months in length
- Juvenile Court Judicial Officer is central and will monitor the progress of each participant, and based on performance, may result in the participant receiving an incentive or graduated sanction.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Juvenile Gun Court is an early intervention program which targets juveniles in their initial incidents of gun related offenses, focusing on their poor decision-making skills.

PROGRAM PHASES

Phase I (Weeks 1-8)

Orientation to the program

Appear in court weekly for review

Submit to random drug screen

Maintain school/work attendance

Participate in the Gun Program

Complete Community Service (40 hours)



PROGRAM PHASES

PHASE II (Weeks 9-15)

Bi-monthly court appearance (if progress permits)

Submit to random drug screening

Complete any other court ordered counseling programs

PHASE III (Weeks 16-24)

Monthly appointment with probation officer

Monthly court appearance

Submit to random drug screen

Maintain school/work attendance

All court fees should be paid

ADAPTING THE MODEL TO DENVER



THE ACTION PLAN

- Active engagement from District Attorney's Office and Public Defender's Office
- Willingness to consider second time offenders at the discretion of the DA and some VRA cases
- Process
 - Screen by CYDC and remain in custody until Return of Filing
 - Fast track filing decision, offer on non-VRA cases, and discovery to defense by ROF
 - Plea and sentencing as early as ROF
 - Probation will fast track the PSI process

Program

- 6-12 months depending on history and performance in the program
- Phase 1 (Orientation), Phase 2 (5 week program, UPS, CAP),
 Phase 3 (aftercare)

COMMUNITY ACCOUNTABILITY BOARD

 The CAB will be comprised of 6 community members who will monitor a participant's progress and offer direction

 In addition to the one in-court review per month, each youth will also have one CAB review per month.

5 WEEK CURRICULUM

The goal of this program is to introduce important concepts such as:

- Victim empathy
- Self-care
- Legal consequences of crime
- Community consequences of crime
- The importance of positive peer relationships
- Education and pro-social activities
- Maximum of 12 participants
- Family engagement
- Final Project

PROBATION APPROACH

- More intensive probation with a PO who has a smaller caseload
- PO will develop relationships with family, teachers, and other important adults to more closely monitor
 JV
- JV will be subject to unannounced visits at home and school
- Parents are encouraged to monitor JV's social media and belongings for evidence of gang involvement and/ or gun possession.
- UPS requirement







WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Response to crime that focuses on addressing & repairing harm

Focuses on:

- Making things right for victim
- Reintegrating defendant into community with skills & awareness to prevent future crime

Community Group Conference:

- What harm was done?
- Who was affected?
- How can offender take responsibility & repair the harm?

WHY RESTORATIVE DENVER?

- Provides Victims with a Voice
- Reduces Recidivism
- Increases Public Safety
- Empowers & Engages Communities
- Increases defendants' understanding & empathy
- Cost Savings

CASE ELEGIBILITY

 County court cases – no DV or sex cases

- Victim is open to having case handled through RJ process
- Defendant is willing to take accountability and repair the harm



VICTIMS

Victim Participation:

- 100% Voluntary
- Personally participate
- Choose a surrogate to participate

• Victim Learnings:

- Many are open to RJ, but don't want to be involved
- Consistent with findings from other RJ programs

HOW DOES IT WORK?

• DA Screening – refer to TCC

Written Agreement

POST-CONFERENCE

Monitor Compliance

Case Dismissed & Sealed

Track Recidivism



• 3-6 Months from Referral to Completion

CASE TRENDS

- Assault 3 (non-DV)
- Theft
- Criminal Mischief
- Careless Driving Causing Injury
- Menacing
- Bias-Motivated Crimes (depending on facts)

COST & CAPACITY

COST:

\$1000 per case from referral to dismissal

CAPACITY:

6 Cases per month

HOPE:

Expand to 8 Cases per month
